MEMORANDUM

Subject:

Property of Dave Tatsuno at 1625 Buchanan Street, San Francisco

At 1:30 Saturday afternoon, September 26, 1942, Major Santelli telephoned from the above address to request assistance in settling a dispute between Tatsuno, owner of real property, and Mrs. J. Alvarez who, together with her husband and two foster children, occupied the premises.

. At Major Santelli's request the writer went to the address and there met the Major, Dave Tatsuno, Mr. Ross, a civilian guard for the Wartime Civil Control Administration in whose custody Tatsuno was released from Tanforan, and Mr. O'Connell, a plain clothes detective of the San Francisco Police Department.

By way of background, it appeared that the Tatsunos leased the premises to the present tenant, exclusive of a store room on the main floor and two store rooms in the basement in which the Tatsunos stored large quantities of furniture and other personal property, including some from their dry goods store. A few items of property they permitted the tenant to use. The store rooms were allegedly locked by Tatsuno before evacuation.

Upon receiving notice of his transfer to Delta, Utah, Tatsuno obtained permission to come to San Francisco to select from the stored household goods the pieces he desired forwarded to him in the relocation area.

He called at this residence on September 25th, the tenant then being away and is understood to have forced the front door and gained access to the premises. He found innumerable items which he had left in the store rooms being used by the tenant, who had made a practice of frequently calling at Tanforan to assure the Tatsunos that everything was all right at home. The original call was made by Tatsuno in the compnay of a Joe Gibbs. He was permitted to return to the premises from Tanforan on Saturday, September 26, 1942.

Tatsuno was much concerned over the fact that the store rooms had been entered and, according to his story, they gave evidence of having been ransacked and the contents disturbed. He was much incensed and appeared desirous of instituting some form of legal action against the tenant for violation of the terms of the lease agreement which was understood to exclude the rooms in question. The lease was not presented for examination. As a corollary, a dispute had arisen between Tatsuno and the tenant as to the ownership of certain of the items of property in use.

After long discussion, the items in dispute narrowed down to four, including a coffee table, a table lamp and two bedspreads. A considerable quantity of property was returned to the main floor store room Saturday afternoon and the room temporarily sealed by the writer.

Arrangements were made for the return of Tatsuno to San Francisco on Monday, September 28th to complete the business of selecting goods for forwarding to Delta, Utah and complete the discussion with the tenant.

This morning at nine o'clock the writer again returned to 1625 Buchanan Street. The following persons were also present:

Mr. R. R. Zellick, Assistant Trust Officer, Anglo California National Bank, agent for Tatsuno;

O'Connell of the San Francisco Police Department;

Captain McFadden of the Wartime Civil Control Administration;

Ross, civil guard of the Wartime Civil Control Administration;

Dave Tatsuno, Alice Tatsuno, his wife; Chiye Watanabe, sister of Dave Tatsuno and Roy Watanabe, her busband.

After continued altercation, the ownership of the remaining items in dispute was clearly established and all property of the Tatsunos then visible and in use on rented portion of the premises was returned to the main floor store room, which was locked and sealed with seals provided by Mr. Zellick. The basement store rooms were examined and they were likewise locked and sealed.

The tenant agreed to quit the premises at the earliest possible moment, as soon as new quarters could be found, and Tatsuno proposed to have the house occupied by a friend.

The War Relocation Authority is prepared to open the warehouse at 1595 Van Ness Avenue if it becomes necessary to move the property from the house for its protection, but the present plan is to leave all the property there due to its great bulk.

The Anglo California National Bank will continue to represent Mr. Tatsuno and make arrangements for the forwarding of certain property to Delta, Utah, or arrange for the necessary crating and hauling of the property if they desire to store in the War Relocation Authority warehouse.

Dear Sir:

I received the letter from Mr. Everson of Sentember 28 enclosing the inventory of the heavy pieces at the home of Dave Tatsuho) 1625 Buchanan Street.

We also have received a letter from Dave Tatsuno, dated September 29, going into three pages, which, for the most part, repeat the many accusations which came up out at the house. He gives us several names of prospective tenants whom he feels he can trust (?) to look after the house and take care of the personal property.

However, there is one paragraph of his letter that I believe is worthy to repeat, as follows:

"If you can also arrange for periodic check-up of other properties under your jurisdiction in cooperation with the WCCA and the Federal Reserve Bank, it would be a good thing as so many evecuees have been telling me and Mr. Tamotsu Sakai that they are not completely satisfied with the handling of their affairs. Surely, as innocent victims of mass hysteria kindled by war, we should have a little more consideration by the Federal authorities. As agent of many evacuee accounts, will you confer with Mr. Armstrong and Major Sanitelli to see if some way can be found for better check up of the evacuee's property. Of course, when I say this, I do remember the shortage of man-power and the fact that this is war and others are losing much, but if it is at all possible to have something done, all of us will more than appreciate. I do realize the practical difficulties that you are up against."

This paragraph did not make a very favorable impression on us, although we believe that his remark that "they are not completely satisfied with the handling of their affairs" was not intended strictly for us, but apparently included all kinds and types of property handled by your organization and ourselves and other banks and agencies. My own objection is that a great deal of time, effort and money is being expended to make things as easy as possible, and certainly everyone is trying.

Dear Mr. Armstrong:

At long last, I am getting off this muchbelated letter of thanks to you for all the help
you gave me during the trouble I had in my house
in San Francisco late in September. Ever since then
I often thought of writing to you to show you my
appreciation, but, somehow, I did not get around to
it till this evening. I had written Major Carl
Sanitilli about two weeks after the incident, and
it was my intention to thank you formally about the
same time, but here I am now. Not only would I like
to thank you for your beyond-routine aid, but I am
truly thankful that we nise is can look up to men of
your calibre for understanding and intelligent
sympathy.

Just to add a personal touch, this is what I am doing now here at the new boom city of Topaz: am acting as head of the Cooperative Dry Goods Division since the beginning of October. Had our grand opening last Wednesday, and we had over 3,000 people come into the new store building which is the regulation WRA recreation hall (100 x 20 ft.), and our sales for the first day ran up to \$2,700. We have a staff now of 12 young people, and you can well imagine that our staff is kept mighty busy. We have the following 9 departments: men's wear, ladies' wear, boy's wear, girl's wear, baby shop, shoe-slipper shop, household goods, notions, piece goods, with an additional toy department for the holidays.

Associating with such fine men as our superintendent, Mr. Walter Honderick, former Washington University man, a YMCA man, and Mr. Emil Sekerak, a Ohio State grad and Co-op expert, makes the work very interesting. Last week our Co-op group went to Salt Lake City for 4 days, and I spent all Friday and Saturday buying dry goods for the store. They are now talking about sending me to St. Louis within a month to do our spring and summer buying for the dry goods store. This is a wonderful experience for me, and I am truly enjoying it all.

I have come to realize more and more that this is indeed a very small world, for here at Topaz I have already met a caucasian young lady who used to sit three rows behind me for three years in my junior high school registry class in San Francisco. She is now the wife of the director of the Community Welfare department here. Also Mr. Caleb Foote, the executive secretary of the Fellowship of Reconciliation, a Friend service group, who is now residing at our troubled home, was here to visit us on his round of all the WRA centers, and I was really surprised to find that he had known Mr. Sekerak of our Co-op from before.

We are all fairly well settled now and are getting quite acclimated to the extreme weather condition here. Though we had several snow storms about a month ago, we are having sunny weather here almost every day these days. Of course, as a San Franciscan, accustomed to the mild Bay Area weather, it is quite a hardship to have to stand the cold weather here. It was 12 degrees yesterday morning, and we hear that the thermometer can go as low as 30 below zero. I never knew what they used ear-muffs for before, but now I realize they are very handy items to have around.

I hope that this letter will find you and yours in good health. And again, as I close, thank you very much for everything. Fellow Americans like you make us realize the worth of democracy and spurs us on to do our share, though so little, behind wire fences in American's hinterland.

Dear Mr. Tataumo:

I am writing you with release to a conversation which I had yesterday at my desk with Miss Grace Sheppard who is the former adopted daughter of Mrs. Alverez, although I understand she was never legally adopted. Apparently there has been some family friction which has caused the young lady, who is 18 years old, to leave the Alvarez home and place verself in the hands of the proper civil authorities.

In the course of the investigation by the authorities and in conversation with Miss Sheppard they received information relative to Mrs. Alvarez which caused the visit of yesterday at my lesk. I am passing it on to you with the thought that you should be apprised of the circumstances.

Miss Shappard in her statements, confir ed your allegations relative to the withdrawal of your furnishings and personal affects from the storerooms on your premises at 1625 Buchanan Street at various times during Mrs. Alvarez's residence there, and the appropriation of these articles to her own use and some cases, it was stated, that she actually sold them and retained the cash. Miss Shappard's accusations go into some detail with reference to approximate time and methods and also refers to particular pieces about which you argued with Mrs. Alvarez. Particular reference is made to such items as the sale of a vacuum cleaner and various yardage material, and the use of your automobile on one occasion for an extended trip. Your car apparently was taken off of the blocks and operated with a temporary bettery.

Obviously there is no proof or legal substantiation of these instances which is available to us and they serely confirm your thoughts and opinions as expressed uring your last visit to the premises. It is evident that there is no method of protecting yourself against a tenant who may be inclined toward acts such as these and there is no agent or management service which could take over to prevent such happenings. The various U. S. Government agencies and the many private firms and banks such as our own, do sverything possible to protect the properties and prevent damage or confiscation. When an instance of this kind happens it is almost impossible to project or take action because of the lack of proof and the inability to identify the personal property.

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The matter was brought to our attention in his instance because it was necessary for the young lady to establish reasons for leaving the alvarez family and the relief agency felt that the charges were sufficiently important to bring them to our notice.

We are writing to the Federal Reserve Bank informing them tentatively of this matter. If there is any way in which you would like to have us follow this matter up or if you have an attorney whom you would like to have us consult we should be glad to do so.

May we hear from you at your early convenience.

Dear Sir:

You may recall that at the time of the transfer of the residents of the Tanforan Assembly Center to the Central Utah War Relocation Project we were requested by a representative of your agency to render assistance to the above-named evacuee in settling a dispute with a tenant of his residence property at 1625 Buchanan Street, San Francisco, California.

Briefly, prior to evacuation from his home area this evacuee had leased the property to a family named Alvarez under a private arrangement, and had stored considerable quantities of goods in two storerooms in the property. The goods stored included certain household furnishings which the tenants were not permitted to use, and also included a rather large quantity of merchandise from the Tatsumo's dry goods store.

On the eve of departure from Tanforan Assembly Center, Mr. Tatsume was given permission to visit his old home and select needed personal property for his trip, at which time he discovered that the tenent had obtained access to the storerooms and had placed in use certain of the property which they contained. Our problem was to re-segregate the property then in use by the tenants and return Tatsume's goods to the storerooms. Tatsume proposed to make arrangements for a new tenant, and with the help of The Angle California Sational Sank of San Francisco, his agent, succeeded in doing so.

So far as we were informed the transaction was satisfactorily concluded, Tatsuno being transferred to the Central Utah War Relocation Project and a new tenant having taken possession of the property.

We are now provided with a letter from The Anglo California National Bank, dated December 15, 1942, a copy of which is enclosed for your information, as is a copy of that bank's letter to Mr. Tatsumo of the same date.

It appears that further problems have been encountered with respect to this property, and it is to be expected that Mr. Tateuno may seek the assistance of the appropriate agency with regard to the matter.

In view of these circumstances we believe the subject should be called to your attention and, feeling that you may consider it within the jurisdiction of the War Relocation Authority inassuch as our authorities in respect to matters of this character have been withdrawn, we have taken the liberty of forwarding a copy of this letter, and of each of the enclosures, to the attention of the Evacues Property Division of the War Relocation Authority.
